

Where's the Smoke?

The Survival Files — Case 13 — ESS = 178.8

According to Wesley Ketchum, M.D., who worked with Edgar Cayce early on, one of the ingredients in a recommended preparation was specified by the entranced Cayce as “Oil of Smoke.” Dr. Ketchum had never heard of Oil of Smoke and the local druggists could find no such item in their catalogs. Ketchum had no alternative but to have another reading in hopes of determining where this arcane substance could be found.

Cayce directed them to a drugstore in Louisville, KY (about 150 miles away), but the manager of that drugstore responded to their telegram by saying that he had never heard of Oil of Smoke. Again, a reading was held, and this time very detailed directions were given. A bottle of the substance would be found on a specified shelf in the back of the store, behind a bottle of another preparation (which was named).

This time, the Louisville store manager wired back: “Found it.” As Ketchum reported: “The bottle arrived in a few days. It was old. The label was faded. The company which put it up had gone out of business. But it was just what he said it was, ‘Oil of Smoke.’”

ESS Score

With a bonus for the unlikelihood of anyone actually knowing where the bottle was, the CS rating is “h+”, CS = 132.

The WR rating is “b”, WR = 46.

With a bonus point for the insistent repetition, the IC rating is “n+”, IC = 0.8.

Total ESS Score: $132 + 46 + .8 = 178.8$
